## Statement of Interests

I have worked on decision making and family influences on decision making for over 40 years. I was initially trained as a psychologist with specialties in persuasion, attitude change, and decision making, but later expanded this research program to embrace social work and public health. My research focuses on adolescent and young adult problem behaviors, particularly those related to unintended pregnancy, mental health, and substance use. I have developed effective parent-based interventions to teach parents how to more effectively communicate and parent their adolescent children so as to reduce the risk of problem behaviors. I have developed protocols for contraceptive counseling of young adults in health clinics based on decision science. I also have an extensive background in psychometrics and statistical methods. I have written books on the analysis of interaction effects in statistical models and I teach graduate courses on structural equation modeling. I have written several influential articles on arbitrary metrics. Finally, I have written about theory construction and creative thinking.

I trained under and worked closely with Professor Martin Fishbein, an influential attitude theorist whose work is widely used in applied settings. My work is heavily cited. My Hirsch (h) impact score is 97, which is in the top 1% of psychologists and also of social work researchers, my core disciplines. Based on research citations, I was recently named to the top 6 most influential contemporary social work researchers in the field (Thyer, Smith, Osteen & Carte, 2018, *The 100 Most Influential Contemporary Social Work Faculty as Assessed by the h-Index, Journal of Social Service Research*). In a study of the most cited researchers in the world covering 22 scientific fields and 176 sub-fields, I was ranked in the upper half of the top 1% of the most influential scientists worldwide (Baas, Boyack & Ioannidis, 2021). This analysis was based on a composite indicator of scientists' career-long citations, h-index, co-

authorship adjusted hm-index, and citations to papers in different authorship positions. I also have received the Aaron Rosen award for lifetime contributions to social work.

### **Additional Service Activities within the State and Federal Government**

Over the years, I have served on a large number of state and federal government panels for purposes of providing expert advice on the formulation of national policy and research agenda. Examples include multiple panels sponsored by the National Institute of Health and the National Academy of Sciences. I was a member of the core research team for the National Longitudinal Study of Adolescent Health (Add Health), a \$26 million survey on adolescent health sponsored by the federal government to establish a national data base. This is one of the largest such surveys ever conducted.
